# ABBE CENTER FOR COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH

## Club 520: A Place to Belong

Loneliness.

It impacts each of us – and no one more so than those struggling with mental health. Isolation has been identified as the No. 1 issue for people with a mental health diagnosis.

That's where Abbe Center's Club 520 comes in. "It's a recovery/wellness center to help adults with a mental health diagnosis and/or substance abuse issue connect. Having social connections is important and can improve quality of life and positively impact health," explains Cheryl Schatzle, Abbe Center supervisor for community-based services. "Abbe Center's Club 520 is staffed by peer support specialists who have firsthand experience with a mental illness and are at a stage in their recovery where they are able to assist others in their recovery." Staff have specialized peer support training and ongoing education.

One of those peer consultants is Mike Meyer. "As someone who has struggled with isolation myself, I know what Club 520 means," says Mike. "You're accepted here. People know you and greet you by name."

Club activities include lunch-and-learns, cooking projects, crafts, karaoke, board games, special holiday events and more. Individuals can join in, read a book or just have a cup of coffee and talk. Computers are available for job searches and assessing other resources. Some events, from bowling and picnics to climbing Mt. Trashmore, take place offsite. Mike adds, "We have people waiting in the hall at noon for us to open. It's that important to them. But Club 520 isn't a rigid program. It empowers you to take control of your recovery. You decide if you want to come and what you want to do."

Club 520 will be even more accessible when Abbe Center moves to its new location at 615 5th Street SE, Cedar Rapids (the former Stamats building). St. Luke's Auxiliary

donated \$250,000 towards creating a welcoming space for the Club. "That's a big gift for us," says Auxiliary member Connie Robinson. "We feel strongly that mental health affects everyone in a community. When the opportunity arose to support the advancement of mental health services, we knew that was something we wanted to put our arms around."

Mike agrees. "If Club 520 had been available when I was first struggling with mental health, it would have improved my quality of life. Even today, being a peer support worker has given me a sense of purpose that helps in my recovery. The ups and downs in my life have brought me here to help others."

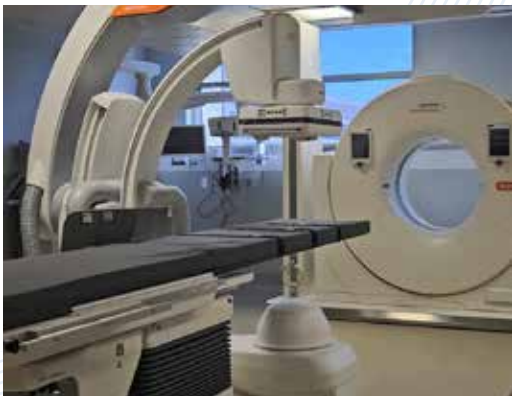


## HEART EXPANSION CAMPAIGN

# A New Era in Heart and Vascular Care

The opening of UnityPoint Health – St. Luke’s Vascular & Interventional Radiology (IR) marks the completion of Phase 2 of the hospital’s \$25 million heart and vascular expansion that began in 2022.

The new suite enables St. Luke’s heart and vascular team to meet the growing demand for cardiovascular services. It features two fully operational vascular and IR labs with the latest equipment, including a dedicated computed tomography (CT) machine, along with a third lab to accommodate future expansion. The new space also includes nine new pre- and post-operative patient rooms.

“The new space allows patients to receive all their care, from prep through recovery, in one coordinated setting, without having to go to another part of the hospital for a CT scan or recovery room,” explains Lia Dickes, manager of St. Luke’s Vascular and Interventional Radiology. “As soon as their procedure is finished, they can be rolled just a few feet to where their family is waiting.”

Procedures performed in the new unit include imaging and CT-guided biopsies, as well as placing ports, removing blood clots from the lungs, putting in a gastrostomy tube (G-tube) for extra nutrition and

removing clots to restore blood flow to the legs.

Phase 1 of St. Luke’s Heart and Vascular Center expansion, completed in 2024, introduced two new electrophysiology labs, doubling the hospital’s capacity to implant pacemakers, defibrillators and perform cardiac ablations to correct irregular heart rhythms. St. Luke’s Heart & Vascular Center continues to grow. Next up is Phase 3, which will add a state-of-the-art hybrid operating room (OR). A hybrid OR is specifically designed for minimally invasive procedures like transcatheter aortic valve replacement (TAVR) that St. Luke’s was the first to offer in Cedar Rapids.

St. Luke’s Structural and Interventional Cardiologist Richard Kettelkamp, DO, says proudly, “This expansion opens the window for us to accommodate the growing number of people who need our specialized care. We are committed to helping patients return home sooner, recover faster and live longer, healthier lives.”

# Honoring a Life with Music

As a pastor, Jon Moss was often at the bedside for a person's dying moments. It was important to Jon that the person and their family be supported during such heartbreaking times.

Jon passed away unexpectedly in 2023 at another hospital after a brief illness. His wife Sharon recalls, "On Jon's last day, a music therapist was with him when we went to the hotel to check in. While we were gone, he passed. The music therapist said she played 'Be Thou My Vision' – one of Jon's favorite hymns. We knew that was a comfort to him, and that was also a comfort to us."

Sharon and her daughters wanted to honor Jon's memory in a way that was meaningful. Daughter Angie Moss explains, "I work at St. Luke's, so I reached out to Tonya Arnold in the Foundation. I shared my dad's story with her and she suggested supporting music therapy for Hospice patients."

Music therapy is available at St. Luke's but unfortunately it's not always covered by insurance. "Music therapy provides an opportunity for patients and families to reminisce, share cherished memories and express their feelings of grief," says Kim Mente, Inpatient Hospice lead nurse.

"We have had patients who were restless become calm and patients who were anxious be able to sleep."

When the idea of supporting music therapy was brought up, the Moss family knew it was perfect. They worked with St. Luke's Foundation to establish the Jon C. Moss Music Therapy Fund. The family will contribute to it every year and encourage others to contribute, too. They've also helped to establish a food pantry in Jon's memory in Hiawatha.

"My dad was a genuinely good, kind person," says Angie. "He loved people and they loved him. He loved music, too, and it meant a lot to know he had that in some of his last moments. We're glad we can help support others facing their end of life."

# HELEN G. NASSIF COMMUNITY CANCER CENTER

## *On the Road for Cancer Prevention*

Cancer is on the rise in Iowa. The latest Iowa Cancer Registry report finds we have the second highest incidence rate of cancer cases in the nation.

That sad fact has prompted the Helen G. Nassif Community Cancer Center to take its message about cancer prevention on the road. "We do a great job once a person is diagnosed, getting them connected with the services and support they need," says Andrea Watkinson, Community Cancer Center executive director. "We also saw an opportunity to increase awareness when it comes to preventing cancers."

The result is the Community Cancer Center Education Program. Andrea, along with Community Cancer Center manager Matt Schmitz and dietitian Beth Beckett, have been speaking to communities and groups at area businesses and organizations about how they can reduce their individual cancer risk.

"People know there's a link between diet and diabetes, diet and heart disease, but they don't realize up to half of all cancers are related to lifestyle factors," explains Beth. "We talk about the importance of a plant-based diet. That doesn't

mean becoming vegan or vegetarian. It's about making healthier choices for yourself and your children."

Matt adds, "Exercise and nutrition are things we can control to lower our cancer risk. If you do develop cancer, these things can help you stay stronger while you're undergoing treatment and into survivorship."

The Education Program presentation also includes screening guidelines for early detection and information on genetic testing and counseling available at the Community Cancer Center. "Unless someone has cancer, they may not be aware of all the services we provide," says Andrea. "We have the widest range of services in the region for cancer patients, survivors and their loved ones. With the help of our donors, most of our services are free whether or not you received cancer treatment at St. Luke's."

# Making Wishes Come True

Every day, St. Luke's Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation (PM&R) helps people of all ages recover from brain and spinal cord injuries, stroke and chronic neurological conditions. "Our goal is to enable people to grow stronger, regain function and return to the life they want," explains Lisa Ainsworth, rehab therapy manager.

St. Luke's PM&R provides inpatient and outpatient therapy, drawing patients from throughout Eastern Iowa. "They come here for our expertise and advanced equipment," Lisa says. "We're always looking at best practices and identifying new equipment so we can continue to help our patients achieve their goals."

You can support individuals on their road to recovery when you give to the St. Luke's PM&R Wish List. Contributions from generous donors, including a lead gift from The Hall-Perrine Foundation, recently made it possible for St. Luke's to acquire the innovative HydroWorx 300, a freestanding, underwater treadmill. With this equipment, St. Luke's is the first rehab center in our community to offer aquatic therapy.

Heading PM&R's 2025 Wish List is the Bioness Integrated Therapy System (BITS). This technology features an interactive touchscreen and advanced programs to help patients improve hand-eye coordination, balance and cognitive issues. Fun activities motivate patients to do more, while the BITS data helps the PM&R team measure improvement.

Also on the Wish List is the Barihab™ XKS, a versatile treatment table designed to accommodate patients of all sizes in a way that's safer for both the patient and therapist. Notes Lisa, "It's a way to work smarter, not harder, while helping patients with everyday activities like sitting and standing."

She adds, "Just as if I were treating a loved one of my own, I want patients to have the best equipment and the best care, so they can have the best outcome. The purchase of this equipment allows us to do that in a safer and more effective way."

# Meet Officer Kyah

There's a new member of the UnityPoint Health – St. Luke's Hospital security team! Kyah, a one-year-old German shepherd, is officially on duty to help ensure the overall safety and security for patients, visitors, team members and volunteers.

Officer Kyah works closely with her partner, Security Officer Jim Flint, who brings a decade of experience as a former K-9 handler at the Iowa Department of Corrections. Together, Jim and Kyah may be called upon to deter disruptive behavior, help de-escalate violent situations, detect controlled substances and more.

"Kyah is not a pet therapy dog," explains Jim. "She's here to work and keep the hospital safe. Because of that, we ask that people refrain from petting her when she's on duty."

Off-duty, Officer Kyah lives with Jim, where she can kick back and relax with her favorite chew toy. "Just like the rest of us, Kyah likes to take it easy after hours," laughs Jim. "But when she's working, she's all business."

The St. Luke's Hospital K-9 program is made possible thanks to support from St. Luke's Foundation. Foundation President Mary Klinger explains, "K-9 security dogs like Officer Kyah require special training to be certified for this work, which can cost as much as \$107,000. Annual expenses are projected to be \$15,000. As long as she is in good health, Kyah will be a part of our St. Luke's team for years to come."

Carol and Paul Collingsworth found the answers when they worked with Johni Hays, senior vice president with Thompson & Associates. St. Luke's Foundation has engaged Johni to provide complimentary and confidential estate planning services to friends and supporters of the Foundation.

Carol says, "We talked to Johni about creating a trust. Our goal was to ensure our three children would benefit the most, but we also wanted to give back to St. Luke's. We've come up with a solution that supports those goals, while maximizing our retirement funds."

Paul and Carol are replacing their standard wills with a 20-year charitable trust that's expected to produce a higher return on their investment – ultimately resulting in more money to give to their children as well as to the hospital.

Giving to St. Luke's was important to the couple for multiple reasons. Carol worked in the clinical lab for 44 years while Paul cites his personal experiences as a patient. The couple also saw an opportunity to honor the memory of their first daughter, Kelsey, who passed away in 1985.

"She spent her short life in St. Luke's NICU, and even though her outcome didn't turn out the way we hoped, Kelsey had exceptional care," explains Carol. "Half of our donation will go to the clinical lab to recognize the key contributions the laboratory makes in improving patient health and outcomes, and the other half to the NICU so Kelsey's name will live on."

Paul adds, "We weren't sure what to expect when we started working with Johni but it was an excellent exercise. We learned a lot. Our solution may not be something that applies to everyone, but it could also be very beneficial to others, their children and their legacy."

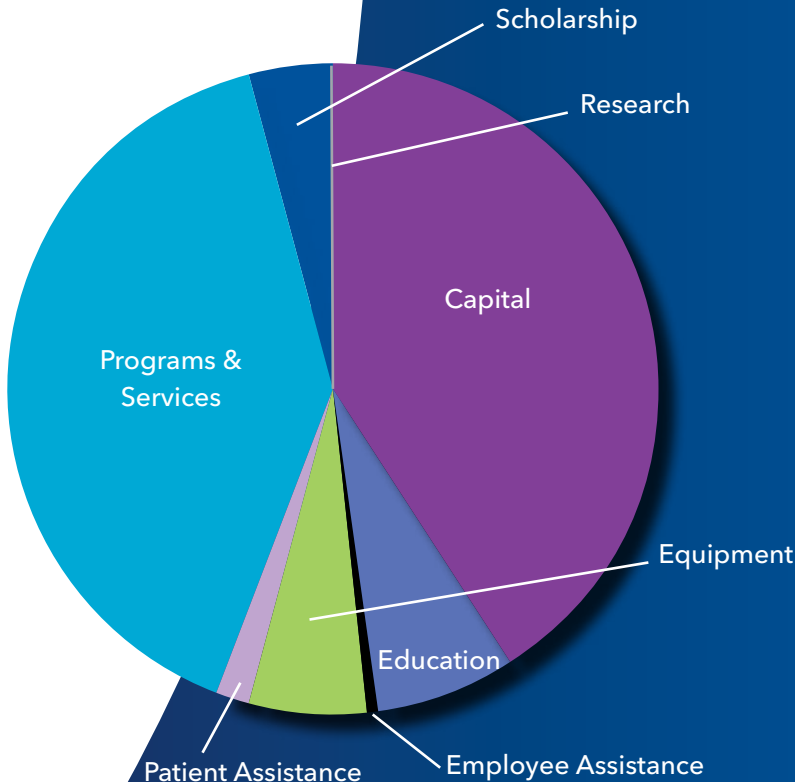

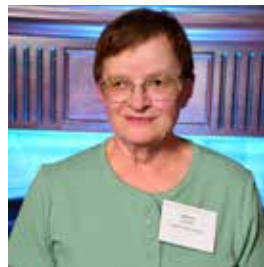

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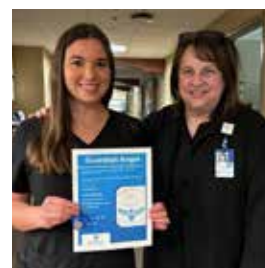
