Thanking Paula's Guardian Angels

After four decades running the pharmacy at UnityPoint Health - St. Luke's Hospital, Jim Willett has a wealth of clinical knowledge and expertise. When his wife, Paula, was diagnosed with an aggressive form of pancreatic cancer, Jim realized he was going to have to provide a level of care unlike anything he had experienced.

"I'd never cared for someone in such an intense, personal manner," admits Jim. "But St. Luke's Hospice helped me tremendously. I learned a lot from them, and Paula felt so encouraged by her Hospice team's visits and spiritual discussions with Chaplain Jeff."

For several months, Paula fought a courageous and, at times miraculous, battle with cancer. Jim says he viewed every extra day with her as a bonus. In March 2025, Paula passed away with her loving husband at her side. Since then, Hospice has continued to be there for Jim.

"Hospice taught me you can't hide from grief," Jim explains.

"They also helped me learn to accept grief and reconcile with it, so healing can begin."

Because Hospice meant so much to Paula and Jim, he made a Guardian Angel donation to her care team through St. Luke's Foundation. The Guardian Angel program is a way to honor caregivers who make a difference for patients and families.

The donations in Paula's name also meant Jim could select a photograph from St. Luke's Healing Power of Art program as a memorial to her. The stunning image of a sunset in all its glory is now on display in the hospital's main hallway.

"Hospice has a very difficult job to do, but they were there for us with the right words and the right care," adds Jim. "Hospice helped us, so I wanted to help them."

WITWER CHILDREN'S THERAPY

Making a Lasting Difference for Children

One family's generosity will make a difference for some special kids receiving care at UnityPoint Health - St. Luke's Witwer Children's Therapy – now and in the future. The Dr. Azeemuddin and Faaiza Z. Ahmed Family Endowed Fund for Brachial Plexus Care will serve children of all ages who are impacted by these specialized injuries.

The brachial plexus is a group of nerves that sends signals to the shoulder, arm and hand. Injury to these nerves can cause weakness, loss of feeling, even paralysis. While there are many ways a brachial plexus injury can occur, most kids receiving care for it at Witwer Children's Therapy experienced the injury at birth or through early trauma.

"As these children grow, their goals and abilities change right along with them," explains Kelli Johnson, Witwer Children's Therapy manager. "That's why our relationship with a patient often continues over time. This endowment will help us continue to serve patients who need brachial plexus care."

Uses for the endowment funds may include

specialized equipment to help children achieve their best outcomes as they grow and change, as well as advanced education for team members to enhance the care they provide.

"All of us at Witwer are honored by the Ahmed family's trust in us," says Kelli. "Their decision to create this fund reflects both their deep compassion, and their vision for making a lasting difference in the lives of children and families. With their support, we can continue to provide excellence, empathy and hope."

KIRKPATRICK ENDOWMENT

Helping People Help Themselves

Minnie May "Mickey" Nading was a student at St. Luke's School of Nursing when she caught the eye of a medical student at Washington University in St. Louis. Wendell Kirkpatrick said he knew after just two dates that Mickey was "the one." Theirs was a love story that would last for more than 73 years. Now their legacy will live on for decades to come.

Dr. Kirkpatrick passed away in 2023 and Mickey followed him less than a year later. Their daughter, Nan Dodson, recalls, "They were wonderful, kind, loving people, and they were always in service to others. They lived their beliefs—the Ten Commandments and The Golden Rule—by always giving to others. My mom liked to say that money is only as good as what you do with it."

Before their passing, Mickey and Wendell designated part of their estate for charitable giving, setting aside funds for 12 organizations including their alma maters. The money donated to St. Luke's and Washington University is being used to endow scholarships in Mickey and Wendell's names.

The Kirkpatrick Endowment at St. Luke's will help individuals who are pursuing a career in nursing. The scholarships can be used towards an Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN), Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN), Master of Science in Nursing (MSN), and Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP).

That emphasis on education reflects Wendell and Mickey's commitment to investing in people for a brighter future. "Education always came first for my parents," explains Nan. "Mom felt she got a really good education at St. Luke's. She knew education could help other families live a better life."

Nan adds, "Mom and Dad were very generous throughout their lifetimes, but they also believed in helping people help themselves. I know they would be very happy their donations are being used in this way. And my siblings and I are happy that the memory of our parents will live on through their endowment."

IGRANT PROGRAM

Team Giving Helps Patient Care in Many Ways

Severe depression can derail a person's life. While treatment is available, some patients do not respond to traditional antidepressants.

"These individuals may have tried multiple medications without success," explains Tom Kremer, director of clinic operations for AbbeHealth Services - Associates for Behavioral Healthcare. "Spravato® is a new antidepressant designed to help medication-resistant patients, but no one in our area was providing it. Since our office is known for offering innovative mental health treatments, we decided to establish a Spravato clinic."

To help create the new clinic, Tom applied to St. Luke's Foundation for an iGrant. St. Luke's iGrant program is

funded by donations from UnityPoint Health - Cedar Rapids team members through the annual Team Member Giving Campaign.

"This was the first time our clinic had applied for a grant, but the Foundation was so helpful," Tom explains. "They guided me through the process."

Spravato is an FDA-approved nasal spray that is self-administered by patients themselves. Afterwards, patients remain in the clinic for two hours for monitoring by the staff. The iGrant dollars enabled Associates for Behavioral Healthcare to create a dedicated space with comfortable chairs, TVs, headphones and other amenities.

Already, four out of five patients have shown measurable improvement following Spravato treatment, after having tried everything else without success. Tom says the clinic plans to treat 50 people a year, but as word circulates about the medication, he expects to have many more. The clinic is already receiving referrals from other mental health providers in the area.

He adds, "Our clinic has seen firsthand how iGrant dollars can improve the lives of people in our community. Now we have a commitment from 100 percent of our team members to support the Team Giving Campaign in the future."

The iGrant program is also improving patient care by increasing efficiency for St. Luke's Hospital's Environmental Services (EVS) team.

"Our team members have been relying on old-style pagers to alert them when a patient is discharged so we can clean the room for the next patient, but the pagers kept breaking," explains Brandie Dolter, manager of Support Services. "They also used outdated technology so they couldn't connect to the hospital's EPIC system. Not being able to get the information in a timely fashion was delaying room turnovers and impacting patient care."

That's why Brandie decided to apply for an iGrant to purchase Vocera SmartBadges. The Vocera badges provide real-time communication for the team. As soon as a nurse updates EPIC to report a patient has been fully discharged, EVS is automatically notified.




Team members demonstrate the Spravato process.

Brandie says, "We average 71 discharges per day, and the instant communication has really streamlined our process. Now we're turning over rooms faster, which is better for incoming patients."

The Vocera badges have also resulted in a cost savings for St. Luke's. The former monthly fee for pagers and cell phones has been replaced by a one-time cost for the new, rechargeable devices.

"Having Vocera badges has been a huge team satisfier," says Brandie. "We also make sure our team members know the badges they're wearing came from the iGrant program. Donating to the Team Giving Campaign helps departments like ours invest in new technology that's better for team members and better for patients."


